While living in Rhino Camp, one of the major Ugandan camps accommodating southern Sudanese refugees, she became involved in tailoring and income generation classes under the Jesuit Refugee Service. After returning to southern Sudan in 2008, she approached MCC with her vision for women's empowerment.

Today, she's the administrator of an organization called the Mother's Union that provides tailoring and sewing courses, along with information on marketing and business concepts. Women also receive life-enhancing information on topics such as basic health care, home sanitation, personal hygiene and nutrition.
